In 1994, a request was made to Variety WA for toys to be given to children taken from domestic violence situations and sheltered in women's refuges. The result was the formation of Toy Bank, a committee headed by the late Holly Wood; dedicated community worker and social columnist for The Sunday Times.

The Toy Bank Committee organises and hosts several morning teas and luncheons throughout the year, with guests paying a small ticket price and donating a new toy at each event. The toys are then collected and distributed throughout the year to refuges and shelters in both regional and metropolitan WA.
